Welcome to the latest and last "Newsletter" for Aberdeen-Angus members. As many of you will now be aware, 2017 will see the introduction of many new changes, largely across our print and on-line publicity material.

This year will see the role out of a brand new quarterly edition of The Review which is aimed at being a merger of the Newsletter, The Angus and The Review. The Breed Promotion committee have put a lot of work and research in to making sure a timely and topical magazine will land on your door mats with many more advertising options to suit your own business marketing needs. It will also provide a bigger platform for our vast team of member Clubs to promote their members and activities throughout the year. I for one can't wait to see the March edition arrive in the office. We will also be producing a smaller commercially focussed only flyer for insertion with national press titles.

Helping to ramp up our publicity and communication material, the Society will also be launching a fortnightly newsletter direct to your inbox, as well as a fortnightly blog from me. This will cover a brief run down of where I've been and what I've been up to, as well as other highlights from meetings and events throughout the Society. It will also provide a useful platform to address any burning issues within the Society or breed rather than having to wait until the next official Society publication to address them.

As well as the above changes, this year as you will all know is very firmly on the World Angus Forum. We're highly indebted to the support of our sponsors and the organizing team are delighted to have announced M&S as the headline sponsor for the entire Forum. Their backing of the event coincides with the premium retailer's belief in the brand and the breed and off the back of this relationship some exciting news will also appear in conjunction with the Forum.

Next month sees the start of bull sale fever and I'm very much looking forward to kick starting the programme of events with the Stirling Bull Sales. With demand as strong for the breed as it's ever been I'm confident trade will reflect that.

Cost-cutting measures

The chief executive and chair of the Finance committee have been working hard in the past year to put in place a number of cost-cutting measures to bring the Society's performance back into the black following two years of losses.

Those measures included savings on printing and postage by moving this newsletter online

and also ceasing our attendance at the Livestock Event in Birmingham (all beef cattle showing has since stopped at this event).

Hopefully you will have noticed the difference in your accounts mailed out in early January which show a five figure surplus (£7092) to the year ended 31st October 2016. It was necessary

to go through this exercise before Council would consider increasing any fees; hence the proposal scheduled for the EGM to increase the subscription for breeders to £50+VAT from 1st January 2018 (the first time we have increased this fee in 22 years and also brings us into line with many other breeds).

Council have agreed to introduce a registration fee of £50.00 plus vat for each new bull entered onto the Society Brokerage Scheme. Commencing from the 1st January 2017. Commission collected on royalties will remain at 10%.

Young beef cattle enthusiast wins pedigree heifer courtesy of YDP workshops and The Moss herd

Craig Johnstone from Pitlochry was the lucky recipient of a pedigree Aberdeen-Angus heifer kindly donated by Kevin Moores of the Formby, Liverpool-based The Moss herd, as a result of taking part in a YDP workshop held last summer at Kincardine Castle.

Fifteen-year old Craig has recently taken ownership of the heifer when Kevin delivered her personally to Craig's uncle's farm where she will remain. "I attended my first YDP workshop at Kincardine Castle in Scotland last year with an interest in learning more about working with cattle. I don't live on a farm, but enjoy helping out with my uncle. I never dreamt attending the workshop would see me winning a pedigree heifer."

The heifer, The Moss Felucca R323 was born in April 2015 and is by The Moss herd's stock bull Scholland Wizzard K459 and is out of The Moss Felicia G739, a female sold to the Rawburn herd of Messrs John Elliot, for 7500gns.

Breeder Kevin Moores said: "I'm delighted to be able to offer this exciting prospect to the YDP. The programme is fantastic at both supporting and promoting the next generation of Aberdeen-Angus enthusiasts. Felucca has been bred from one of the herd's most exciting and highly sought after dam lines and has been AI'd to Raff Hercules, offering a strong pedigree line for Craig. I wish him and his family all the very best and look forward to hearing

how she breeds for him."

For the 2017 programme Society junior vice president Angela McGregor has very kindly offered to donate a heifer from her Aberdeenshire-based Newcairn herd. However, this year the Society is opening this up to all keen Aberdeen-Angus enthusiasts via a raffle with proceeds going to the YDP. Tickets (priced £10 each) will be available from Sunday onwards at the Bull Sales in Stirling and at other shows and events throughout the summer (not from the office). More information as to the breeding of this heifer will be made available on the Society's website in due course.



Making registrations easier with Farmplan and Farmdata

The Society is pleased to announce a relationship with Farmplan and Farmdata, whereby their software management programmes are compatible with the Society's registry system.

This allows breeders to process intimations and/or registrations

at the same time as completing either software inputs before emailing them to Yvonne Buchanan in registrations. Commenting on this process, Yvonne said: "This has the potential to be a huge time saving exercise for breeders avoiding duplicate registrations

for yourself, BCMS and the Society."

WORLD ANGUS FORUM DAY PASSES



As bookings are coming in at a strong pace - some of you may have seen the recent update on the World Angus Forum Facebook page that the Early Bird booking offer yielded more than 40 Australian and 60 Canadian delegates alone, plus another 100 from overseas - interest has also mounted on the availability of day rate passes.

The Forum is offering a day rate pass for you to attend any specific day of the tour if you would prefer to dip in and out without worrying about booking a solid section of a tour. These day rates will vary in price according to the day's activities, dinners and entertainment.

From an organisation point of view there are many reasons why you can't arrive on the day in your own transport. While these events are Open Days to a degree, they are not the normal Open Days farmers will be used to turning up to. They

have strict timings for ease of transporting delegates to and from their locations on time (some days include more than one visit in a day), it allows for accurate catering provision, it avoids traffic and parking issues on farms (some holdings will not have adequate car parking space availability) and more importantly it is out of respect for the delegate who have paid to be there.

All delegates whether full tour or day rate will be sent lanyard passes for identification purposes, ease of admin accounting and transportation management.

I hope you will all see the benefit of signing up to day passes of your choice as this is a fantastic opportunity to network with some of the world's finest breeders, as well as visit key herds and attractions of your choosing.

TYPE CLASSIFICATION DEMONSTRATION

The workshop was carried out by Holstein UK's head classifier Meurig James where he gave an in-depth presentation of the benefits of classification and why breeders should think about using it as a management tool.

Sell My Livestock

New partnership announced with Sell My Livestock

The Aberdeen-Angus Cattle Society is pleased to announce that it has teamed up with Sell My Livestock to offer a new online sales platform for members.

From mid February breeders will have access to a brand new area within the Society's website where they can directly advertise stock for sale. All stock advertised will also be automatically listed on Sell My Livestock's main website, which now has more than 15,000 registered farmers in the UK and receives 2000 plus visits from potential buyers every day.

The service is designed for pedigree and commercial stock - the latter will have to be by a named Aberdeen-Angus sire which will need to be stated on the advert.

Users can upload photographs and full descriptions of animals, as well as details of health schemes and links to breed records, such as EBV and pedigree data. For an introductory period, members will be able to advertise pedigree stock for sale free of charge, while there will be a fee of £10 per advert for commercial listings. Pedigree bulls offered for sale over the age of one year will be subject to a minimum price limit of £1800.
